#### A Word from the Chairman

 $G_{\text{good health.}}^{\text{reetings}}$  as always to our patrons - we hope to find you all in

Tonight's production is a return to something a little more conventional, after two grueling productions last year - namely "Jane Eyre" and "The Thrill Of Love". This admittedly slightly fanciful thriller by Robert Thomas (see page opposite) has been good fun to be involved in, and has felt relatively effortless compared to recent offerings. That's not to say it hasn't required a lot of hard work, as no play goes on without that, and for various reasons we've been short of helpers back stage so everyone has had to muck in. But one way or another we have pulled it together, as we always



do, and I hope you'll allow yourselves to be immersed in a twisty thriller that doesn't take itself too seriously.

The society invested a significant amount of its limited funds into purchasing new lighting equipment last year, including some impressive second hand equipment after some lengthy eBay searching. The new equipment was used extensively in both the productions last year, and I think added a real depth and atmosphere to the shows. Modern LED lighting is very versatile for stage application, and has opened up a realm of new possibilities for us. Needless to say, it is also decidedly less power-hungry than the old battens of 60w bulbs, and the lower heat output makes things rather more comfortable for the actors on stage!

The successful trials meant it was time to remove most of the old lighting rig. Whilst it was certainly time, I confess to feeling a twinge of sadness, as it was evident that a lot of care and hard work had gone into wiring up the old rig. The first installation dates back to 1938 when electricity was introduced to the village, and the serving stage manager, Mr Bill Bromage, made the first switchboard. Prior to that the stage was lit by a single gaslight! Following the extensive renovation works to Little Heath School, it subsequently opened as the village hall in the mid-60s. After a few successful plays to build up funds, the society invested the then princely sum of £60 for Mr Bromage to install a new rig in 1969, and it's likely some of that was still in service. It has been added to and tweaked down the years, with the most recent works being an extensive rewire that was undertaken by Mr David Davies in 2000. I have to say though, I appreciated the many years of service it has provided the society rather more than I appreciated the accumulated dust that came down with it. C'est la vie.

Don't forget to purchase yourself some raffle tickets if you haven't already. There's usually a healthy selection of prizes. For the November production, I finally got round to putting the purple lavender incense into the raffle prizes one night after it had been cluttering up my sideboard since being used as a prop in Hummingbird House the year before. It would make for a nice little prize for someone, but I was glad to see the back of it. The Sunday after the final night of a production is always a chore, taking down the set and packing everything away, particularly as everyone is exhausted. So I was well and truly ready for the traditional family Sunday roast when I called by my parents house later that day. "Excellent play last night," said my mum. "Oooh, and look what I won on the raffle..."

#### **About The Author**

Robert Thomas is a bit of a forgotten man, but he was a prominent figure in French film and theatre throughout the 60s and 70s, not just as a writer but as an actor and director.

He is at least partly credited in creating an entire genre - what you would call *comedy thriller* (or *comédie policière* in his native French). His first major hit was in 1960 with a play called 'Piege Pour un Homme Seul' (or 'Trap For A Solitary Man'), a humourous murder-mystery which became an overnight success in Paris. Alfred Hitchcock bought the rights and planned to make it into a big budget film, but sadly it never made it past pre-production. It eventually did make it into film, albeit a made-for-TV movie in an adaptation called 'Vanishing Act' in 1986. The cast included Elliot Gould (a regular in TV series such as E.R. and Friends, and a long film career that includes American History X and Ocean's Eleven), and Margot Kidder, who also has a long film and TV career, but is best known as Lois Lane in the original Superman films. Both are still working to this day.

Robert Thomas' most celebrated work is '8 Femmes' (or '8 Women'), another dark comedy thriller which won the *Hachette Prix du Quai des Orfevres* for Best Play in 1961. It's fame however, is mostly down to the big budget screen adaptation from 2002 - a musical that plays like a who's who of French talent, including Virginie Ledoyen (The Beach, 2000) and Emmanuelle Béart (Mission: Impossible, 1996). Although the songs don't translate too well if you're relying on subtitles, it is well worth a watch as a bit of an unconventional Christmas film.

Although '8 Femmes' has never had a proper English translation, 'Piege Pour un Homme Seul', which was entitled 'Trap For A Lonely Man' in English, is a play The Dunham Thespians have performed twice, most recently in 2013. Below is a still from the earlier 1975 production, which I was able to scan from an old 35mm slide.
